Dr. Harold E. Raugh, Jr. **British Commission for Military History**

Dr. Harold E. Raugh, Jr., currently serves as Command Historian, U.S. Army Europe, Wiesbaden, Germany. He previously served as Command Historian, United Nations Command, Combined Forces Command, and U.S. Forces Korea, in Seoul, Republic of Korea, from 2015-2017. He also previously served as Command Historian, Defense Logistics Agency, U.S. Department of Defense, Fort Belvoir, Virginia (2014-2015); as Command Historian, U.S. Army V Corps, in Germany (2006-2013); and as Command Historian, Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center and Presidio of Monterey, California (2002-2006).

Dr. Raugh retired from the U.S. Army in 1998 as a lieutenant colonel after twenty years' service as an infantry officer. He served on active duty in the United States; West Berlin; South Korea; the Persian Gulf (Operation Desert Storm); with the United Nations in Israel, Egypt, and Jordan; in Saudi Arabia (Operation Southern Watch); and as a NATO detachment commander in the former Yugoslavia (Operation Joint Guard). He also served as an Assistant Professor of History at the United States Military Academy, West Point, as well as at the Pentagon and at the National Security Agency. Dr. Raugh, who received his Ph.D. in History from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), served as an Adjunct Professor of Military History and National Security Studies, American Military University, Manassas Park, Virginia, from 2000 to 2004.

Dr. Raugh has been contributing to the U.S. and international military history community since he became a book reviewer for *Infantry Magazine* in 1978. Since then, he has written/edited seventeen acclaimed military history books (published in the UK, U.S., Germany, Romania, Serbia, Bulgaria, Austria, and Slovak Republic), and over 170 articles and over 700 book reviews worldwide. He continues to actively contribute to military history publications and serves on the editorial boards of publications in the U.S, UK, Slovak Republic, Serbia, Hungary, India, and the Czech Republic.

He first became an active participant and contributor to the Partnership for Peace Consortium Conflict Studies Working Group (CSWG) in 2008, attending that year's conference in Ljubljana, Slovenia. He has attended most of the annual CSWG conferences since then, has served frequently as a panel discussion leader, and has edited six of the well-received annual conference anthologies.

Dr. Raugh participated in his first International Commission of Military History (ICMH) conference in Sofia, Bulgaria, in 2012. In 2013, he was elected to represent the British Commission of Military History on the ICMH Bibliography Committee and continues to do so. He has submitted 50 book reviews for publication in, and serves on the editorial board of, the ICMH's *International Journal of Military History and Historiography*. Dr. Raugh also initiated the invaluable and influential ICMH quarterly listing of "Forthcoming Military History Conferences" to further engender the spirit of military history professionalism and cooperation and the sharing of best practices.

Dr. Raugh has developed exceptional relationships and an outstanding reputation with Allied and partner military historians, resulting in being, *inter alia*, the first American military historian to participate by invitation in the Russian-Korean Military History Conference, Seoul, Republic of Korea, and first American military historian to participate by invitation in the Japanese-Korean Military History Conference, Seoul, both in 2016; and participant in the Korean Academy of Korean Studies International Military History Conference; Korea Air Force International Korean War Air Power Conference; 32nd International Security Conference, Council on Korea-U.S. Security Studies; and 16th Seoul Historical Conference, Seoul Historical Institute.

An internationally recognized expert on British and European military history and leadership, Dr. Raugh was elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society in the United Kingdom in 2001, a Fellow of the Royal Asiatic Society in 2010, and a member of the British Commission for Military History in 2007.
